Japanese American Day of Remembrance

South commemorated the Japanese American Day of Remembrance on Feb. 20 with a screening of filmmaker Frank Abe's "Conscience and the Constitution." A discussion of the film followed. Abe's film tells the true World War II-era story of a group of young Japanese Americans who refused to be drafted into the war from their Wyoming internment camp unless their rights as U.S. citizens were restored and their families were released. The U.S. government ordered the internment of over 110,000 people of Japanese heritage in the aftermath of the Pearl Harbor attack in 1941. Campus Security Reports

January 7

Back on Jan. 7 a campus security officer witnessed a male pluck two used textbooks from a bookshelf in the bookstore and exit without paying. When approached, the suspect initially denied the theft, stating he had purchased the books but immediately threw away the receipt. After checking with bookstore staff to ensure they hadn't sold the books to the suspect, he was questioned further and eventually changed his story, admitting to the theft. The books, valued at \$164 and \$236, were returned to the bookstore manager.

January 10

A female student was walking in the RSB Courtyard on Jan. 10 when she said a man walked up to her, leaned in close and whispered, "Terrorist, get out of my country." The victim stopped in her tracks and asked the suspect to repeat himself, which he did – repeatedly and with increasing volume – until a South Staff member exited Registration and told the man that language was not tolerated on our campus. The suspect quieted down at that point and slithered away into a nearby building.

January 16

Around 10 a.m. a husband and wife came to the security office to report they witnessed a hit-and-run in the south gravel parking lot. The witnesses wrote down vehicle descriptions and license plate numbers for both vehicles involved (the offending Nissan Altima and the victimized Honda) and gave them to security. Campus Security Director James Lewis investigated the damaged Honda and found a note with contact information on the windshield. When the student came to his office a half hour later, she reported the note was gone. The registered owner of the Altima is not a registered student at South.

January 19-21

A South faculty member contacted security after returning to work from a three-day weekend to report harassment. Over the weekend, the victim received 17 calls of "computer generated text to land-line messages confessing love and how much they care for (her)." Seattle police were contacted to investigate further.
