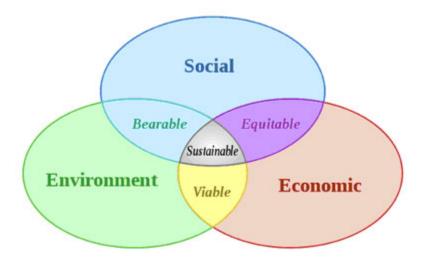
Meeting Minutes

- I. Sustainability tour during Convocation
 - a. Please join us and encourage your colleagues to join us

II. AASHE STARS

- a. South received a STARS Bronze in 2014. We are aiming to submit to STARS in spring 2017.

 - Investment

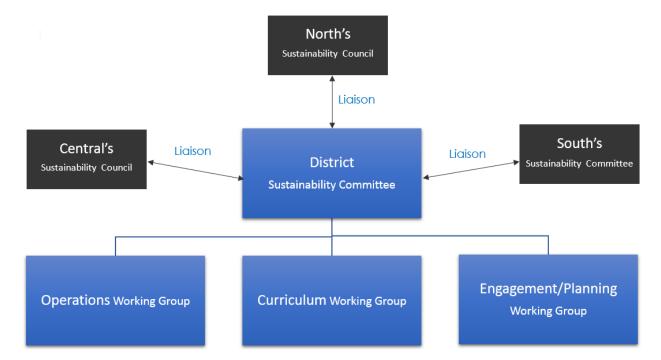

- d. One strategy to collect info is for Adam to attend Faculty Senate. We think they meet once/quarter. Rather than present, try to create an activity to get folks up and moving around.

III. Committee Bylaws

- a. Adam shared the bylaws for Central's newly established Sustainability Council.
- b. We discussed how the campus sustainability councils/committees communicate and coordinate with things happening at the district and at other campuses.
 Adam provided a quick drawing of the different committees and how they are organized, communicate, and how ideas flow on campuses and the district.



- c. Some were concerned that it might be hard to get students to attend meetings on a regular basis. Central's bylaws allows for flexibility in membership (i.e. if positions are not able to be filled the council can still fully function and make decisions). Furthermore, if anyone misses several (number TBD by us) meetings in a row the chair and co-chair can remove that person from the council
- d. Should look into whether students can receive credit, service-learning course, or other incentive to be members
- e. Need to work through Student Leadership to get students on committee

IV. Green Revolving Fund (GRF)

- a. Discussions of how to fund sustainability ideas led to the introduction of the idea of a Green Revolving Fund
- b. GRF's are funds set up to recoup a portion of the savings from energy efficiency projects (e.g. if a lighting project saves \$50,000 over 7 years, a percentage of those savings would be put back into a GRF to help fund future sustainability projects)
- c. The facility directors of all 3 campus, Adam, Tim Albertson, and Phyllis met a couple weeks ago to begin discussing the possibility of a GRF. This will likely be a long process, but the next step right now is to understand what the current energy efficiency projects are at each campus. We need to conduct energy audits to know how much savings is potentially out there. The audits would be completed by a third party, who also would identify potential grants and incentives to help pay for the projects.
- d. Student Activity Fees are a large pot of money, so if we can get more students involved we could access those.

V. Seadrunar tour (recycling facility)

a. Let's not forget about the tour we discussed. Should we schedule something for early October?
