# COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Historical backgrounds and design fundamentals which have affected art. Includes slide lectures, reading and some practical applications.

#### STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES ADDRESSED:

1. Communication - Listen actively to learn and communicate. Speak and write effectively for personal, academic and career purposes.

Students are held responsible for formulation of their own opinions of culturally significant art work. Students are then required to thoughtfully and effectively articulate their ideas through writing and in the context of group discussions. Students engage in direct dialogue with the artist through analyzing the formal elements and the content of the artist's work.

2. Human Relations - Recognize the diversity of cultural influences and values. Use social interactive skills to work in groups effectively.

Students are given the option of executing two out of four class projects as group projects. This involves incorporating the creative input and effort of all group members. Instructor exposes students to works of art from a diverse range of cultures through lectures, prints and slides. Students study the language of art and the function of art works in diverse cultures.

3. Critical Thinking and Problem Solving - Think critically in evaluating information, solving problems and making decisions.

Students have to execute four class projects within a defined amount of time with a certain set of rules. This process requires quick thinking and strong and decision making in order to solve the stated problem.

4. Personal Responsibility - Be motivated and able to continue learning and adapt to change. Value one's own skills, abilities, ideas and art. Take pride in one's work. Manage personal health and safety.

Instructor gives students a solid foundation in the formal elements of art and the vocabulary of art so they will have the tools necessary to analyze works of art that they have not been exposed to before. The instructor encourages the students to value their own skills, abilities and perspectives. Course projects are designed in a sequence that will promote mastery of skills. The instructor provides guidance to students whose chosen course project may require material handling of potentially harmful materials. In these cases the instructor will offer advice and solutions that promote student safety.

5. Information Literacy - Access and evaluate information from a variety of sources and contexts, including technology.

Instructor encourages students to use the library for course research by utilizing books, magazine articles, and the internet. Students are instructed on how they can use a web search engine to study and evaluate today's cultural dialogue.

- 1. Identify characteristics of the art styles from Western civilization. Have an understanding of the cultural, historical, and philosophical background of each movement.
- 2. Analyze the various period styles and formal elements used in the visual arts.
- 3. Demonstrate art techniques and understanding through course projects and exams.
