Course Outcomes / Objectives:

At the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Analyze international films of the 20th and 21st century as an art form that both represents and influences social, political, and cultural movements all over the world.
- 2. Cite key filmmakers from around the globe and their film contributions to world cinema.
- 3. Recognize and discuss the various film genres.
- 4. Discuss the relevance of social, political, historical, and cultural issues and movements presented in the films.
- 5. Analyze film narratives and how filmmakers convey significant themes via plot structure, character development, mise-en-scène, dialogue, cinematography, CGI, etc.
- 6. Demonstrate critical thinking and communication skills in interactive discussions and writing assignments.
- 7. Compose a college-level film analysis essay based on original interpretations, supported by examples from the films and established film criticism.
- 8. Apply film analysis terminology accurately when discussing and writing about films.
- 9. Access and navigate technology associated with the course.

Explain the student demand for the course and potential enrollment:

This course outline revision includes a change of mode to include all 3 class formats: on campus, online, and hybrid. Faculty and administration have found that film courses have been taught effectively on campus and online in the last several years. Offering all 3 scheduling options would meet the student demand for flexible scheduling, accommodates various learning styles, and leads to increased enrollment. Currently, we don't see any challenges due to change of mode. If anything, offering three modes of delivery enhances teaching and learning, and benefits both students and faculty.

Explain why this course is being revised:

HUM130: World Cinema is being revised based on South, North, and Central faculty collaboration to create a common course title, course description and topic outline to be used in the Seattle Colleges District course catalog.

This course revision also includes a change of mode to include all three class formats: on-campus, fully online, and hybrid.

What challenges, if any, do you foresee in offering this course:

Currently, we don't see any challenges due to change of mode. If anything, offering three modes of delivery enhances teaching and learning, and benefits both students and faculty. The Canvas Learning Management System has a vast array of options to accommodate a variety of student learning styles and faculty teaching strategies including discussion forums, video tutorials, imbedded images, weblinks, real time chat and collaboration tools, etc. The eLearning office and TLC staff are available to students and faculty who need assistance with the LMS.
