3. Be able to discuss different responses to issues such as the conflict between science and religion, problems of meaning and death, and the human search for identity
4. Be able to discuss in a written exam the basic components of each major religious tradition, such as its concept of the divine, moral codes, value systems, rituals, and artistic expression
5. Be able to discuss the religious conflicts and trends in the modern world
6. Be able to demonstrate, through testing, a better understanding of his/her own religious background and that of the surrounding community
7. Produce at least one research paper discussing in some detail aspects of at least one major religion studied in this course
